Circle: Since the late 1800s, one way those in Spirit have communicated with those of us in this dimension has been through physical phenomenon, including “table tipping.” Seances which produce physical phenomena usually take place in darkness or in a room lit by a dim red light. Spirit uses a chemical balance obtained from the attendees and their knowledge of electrical impulses to permeate the table’s fibers and cause it to move.

Participants will sit in a circle around a table. Hands will be lightly placed on the table, and the seance will begin with a prayer. The spirit guides of the medium will help to find the spirits who are called upon to communicate. Singing cheerful and uplifting songs helps to raise the vibration in the room. The table surface acts as a reservoir of externalized nervous force. The table will begin to jerk, tilt, and move about. Questions will be asked after a code is established, usually “tip once for yes and twice for no.” Proof of spirit communication becomes evident as the table tips when questions are proposed and answered.

Workshop: The Mediumship Unfoldment Workshop will help you to get in touch with your guides and to understand your Spirit Band. You will learn the conditions necessary for unfolding your mediumship. You will learn about the pitfalls, the ego, and the abuse of power. You will learn about the Natural Laws that govern mediumship, and how to recognize the different phases of mediumship, including what you may expect when you get in touch with your Spirit Guides. You will have the opportunity to give and receive a Spirit greeting. Information on platform decorum will be included.

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A REPORT FROM THE TREASURER

Dear Congregation,

Wayne Knoll, CSE's Board president, has asked me to prepare a brief letter highlighting CSE's financial status and the details around our purchase of the Church building.

At a special meeting of the CSE Membership on Sunday, June 29, 2003, attended by 30 of the 59 CSE members (a majority), there was a unanimous vote to purchase the Woman's Club Building. Terms of the purchase were \$160,000 with a \$60,000 down payment. On September 5, 2003, officers from the CSE and the Woman's Club of Falls Church met to sign a five-year promissory note for \$100,000, held by the Woman's Club, with a loan interest of 6 percent. The note is due in full on June 30, 2008. CSE is paying the interest to the Woman's Club at \$6,000 each year with no reduction in the \$100,000 promissory note

principal, money that the Woman's Club uses for its own charitable donations.

Receipts from building donations are deposited in the CSE Building Fund Account, which has a current balance of \$53,676. The Church also holds three mutual fund and stock portfolios which have a current combined value of \$89,938. The Board has sought advice from investment advisors to ensure a reasonable and low-risk rate of return on portfolio investments. The Building Fund is used for building maintenance and repair and as one source of funding to pay the promissory note. We will keep you posted on Building Fund Account balances which are increased by building fund donations, receipts from building rentals and fundraisers. The Board welcomes any and all ideas -- and volunteers -- to lead viable fundraisers.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER:

Brothers and Sisters in Spirit,



I am pleased to share with you some recent deliberations by your Church's Board of Directors.

We are delighted that Teresita Fawcett (who led a recent workshop on grief which so many of you attended) will direct our Church retreat which will take place at Wellspring in Germantown, MD from Friday evening, May 19th to Sunday noon, May 21st. We have reserved two cabins and are confident that the event will sell out, so consider reserving your place as soon as the details are published. The theme will be "Joy."

We have purchased seven healing benches that have no backs. This design allows healers to proceed without hindrance as they place their hands near vital organs at the back of each person receiving healing.

We have discussed some significant improvements to our building. We are committed to some issues, but others still need to be discussed by the Board. In any case, we want to be completely open with our plans to the membership to solicit your response, advice, and (quite honestly), money. Simply contact any member of the Board. We are hoping to accomplish most of these within the same time frame so as to minimize distractions during Sunday services, workshops and classes.

1. Air conditioning and indirect lighting. We will extend a duct system from our large 5 ton air handlers all the way to the front of the building along each wall at the juncture where walls and ceiling meet. This costly process will create a very efficient air conditioning system which will be mercifully quiet. Mr. Errin Stewart of our church will create a soffit to cover the ducts and simultaneously establish soft indirect lighting to be trained upward and downward behind the soffit. This process was suggested by the professional planning group which was initiated and funded by Merrilee Miller.

2. Vents. We will replace the ancient vents at floor level for the heating system.

3. Cornices. Errin will create and establish cornices above each window to hold drapes, which our Pastor and Merrilee (the co-chairs of the Interior Decoration Committee) will select.

4. Paint. We are considering simultaneously painting the walls a color commensurate with the color of the drapes, both of which the Interior Decor Committee will determine. Errin and crew will do the fine work and we volunteers will paint the wide expanse of the walls which do not require expertise (or brains). Ahem.

5. Color-coordinated carpeting. The air conditioning expert pointed out that all the interior surfaces of the building are "hard," thereby creating echoes and noise. Drapes and carpeting will provide noise dampening and a beautiful meditative atmosphere. A caution is that we eat during fellowship and drop food on the floor. Any ideas?

6. Color-coordinated chairs. We are all in agreement that our existing chairs are not conducive to prayer or health. It is probable that truly comfortable and sturdy chairs would help increase our membership, and certainly facilitate Sunday services.

7. Elevated platform. Merrilee Miller's plan also suggested an elevated platform at the front of the Church which would raise the chairperson, the speaker, and the mediums for improved visibility and communication. The plan envisions a portable platform.

Please share your responses with your Board members. We wish to be transparent with you about all issues. Please read the letter (see page 6) by Larry Leonard, CSE Treasurer, which details our building mortgage. Paying off the mortgage and instituting the improvements listed invite, and even require, engagement from us all. We are inviting you to consider funding any of these improvements in honor of a loved one who would be memorialized in some visible form. We know you will continue to be generous, as you were with the Our Daily Bread drive. After all, it is all in honor of Spirit, isn't it?

CSE EXCEEDS GOAL FOR ODB DONATIONS

Each January, the CSE collects money for the Our Daily Bread (ODB) drive. ODB is a non-profit organization helping people experiencing a temporary crises who are ineligible for standard assistance programs. ODB organizes churches throughout Fairfax to take turns delivering food or grocery gift cards to the families. ODB has trouble getting other churches to help in January because many churches feel "spent" after Christmas, so CSE has traditionally offered to cover the last week of January.

This year, CSE raised \$240 beyond our goal, making our total \$1440! CSE gave 36 Giant grocery gift cards valued at \$40 per family. CSE thanks everyone who donated to this cause and extends its appreciation to member Chris Thomas, who helped organize the effort.

CSE staff found two people who wanted to attend, but couldn't afford the fee since it was hitting during the post-holiday bill season. Both recipients were thrilled with the unexpected gift.

If you aren't already MAD, you should be! If you find value in the CSE, consider giving back in your special way.



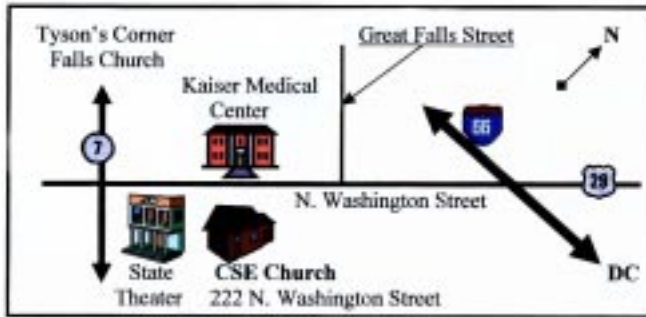
